The Great Lakes Depend on Sea Lamprey Control

• The Great Lakes fishery is worth \$7 billion to the regional economy each year. Sea lamprey control is a major reason for that economic value. Control is achievable, but it must be sustained.

• The Great Lakes Fishery Commission requests \$22.8 million in fiscal 2012 to carry out its program to protect and improve the Great Lakes fishery.

• The Great Lakes Fishery Commission carries out essential fishery management activities in the Great Lakes basin. State, provincial, and tribal governments depend on the commission's program to support the hundreds of millions of dollars they contribute to sustain the sport, commercial, and tribal fisheries, comprising species like trout, salmon, walleye, yellow perch, and sturgeon.

• Major funding reductions would eliminate large portions of the sea lamprey control program, resulting in an immediate, significant economic and ecological impact on the Great Lakes region and setting back fishery restoration by decades.

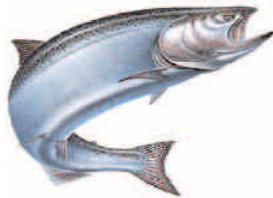

Advisors Support Deferral of Offshore Wind Projects

Canadian Committee of Advisors agrees with government decision to study impacts

On behalf of the stakeholders committed to restoring and enhancing the fisheries of the Great Lakes, the Committee of Canadian Advisors to the Great Lakes Fishery Commission (GLFC) congratulates the Ontario government on its recent decision to defer development of offshore wind turbine projects until further scientific information is garnered, analyzed, and impacts assessed.

In June 2010, along with our colleagues in the United States, we asked the Ontario government to reexamine their approach to wind turbine development in the Great Lakes, and to their credit, they have done just that.

On behalf of the Committee of Canadian Advisors, Dr. John Casselman of Queen's University said: "Wind power on water, like water power, is an important energy resource that should not be developed to the detriment of another valuable and renewable resource – fish and fisheries. Considerable knowledge already exists concerning Great Lakes fish populations and fisheries, but not as it pertains to development of offshore wind installations.

Prototype small-scale installations need to be specifically and adequately studied before any full-scale development is undertaken."

Dr. Terry Quinney, Canadian Advisor representing sport fishing, added: "The Great Lakes are home to some of the greatest freshwater fishing in the world. It is vital that as clean renewable energy sources are developed, it is done in a way that protects this world-renowned natural resource and backbone to our region's economic wellbeing."

The Committee, representing recreational and commercial fishing, aboriginal communities, public-at-large, and academia, also reiterates that they would oppose the placement of wind turbines or any other project within the nearshore and offshore areas of the Great Lakes if they are, at any time, shown to harm the Great Lakes fisheries.



Proposal seeks bigger walleye and more of them in southern Wisconsin

FITCHBURG - The current walleye bag and size limits on many southern Wisconsin waters would change under a proposal aimed at providing anglers more walleye and bigger walleye, simplifying regulations, and boosting naturally reproducing populations of this popular game fish.

Southern Wisconsin fish managers are seeking public opinion on a proposal to change the current default walleye bag and size regulations. The change would address heavy fishing pressure that removes many female walleyes from the population before they have been able to spawn for the first time. Department of Natural Resources fisheries surveys over the past 20 years have shown significantly better walleye populations on lakes with more restrictive length and bag limits, fish managers say.

The proposed change is one of four statewide fisheries questions that people can vote on at the April 11 Spring Hearings held in each of Wisconsin's 72 counties. "Our goal is to make walleye fishing better," says Ben Heussner, the Waukesha-based Department of Natural Resources fisheries biologist leading the issue. "Self-sustaining walleye populations will produce more young fish, and lakes with marginal natural reproductive capability will see better walleye fishing opportunities."

Heussner said the proposal also would simplify the regulations by having only one regulation for the majority of waters in southern Wisconsin. It calls for increasing the minimum size limit from 15 to 18 inches and decreasing the daily bag limit from five fish to three fish in aggregate for walleye, sauger, and hybrids for all waters in 19 southern Wisconsin counties.

"This proposal will optimize fish growth and reproductive potential," says Kurt Welke, a DNR fisheries biologist based in Fitchburg. "Fisheries surveys show that allowing walleye an additional one year of protection from harvest will contribute to more desirable size structure, increased natural reproduction and improved angler catch rates."

Certain waters may be exempted from the proposal because they may not meet the criteria used to forward the rule or because they are currently under an existing more restrictive size and bag limit.

For example, the lower Wisconsin River will keep its current more restrictive limits. Anglers are encouraged to contact their local fisheries biologists with questions on specific waters.

Asian carp threat prompts crisis exercise

Federal, Ont. experts practice emergency response to possible carp invasion in Great Lakes

It's not every day emergency response experts gather to test their readiness to deal with a fish.

But the Asian carp is no ordinary fish, and so on Friday, a boardroom in the Peterborough offices of the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) is being turned into a temporary war room of sorts. It marks the first time government experts have come together to simulate an invasive-species emergency.

"We've run emergency-preparedness exercises before for influenza outbreaks," said Eric Boysen, director of the MNR's biodiversity branch. "We've done them for ice storms. We said we want to run one for Asian carp."

While the Great Lakes are already home to 180 invasive species, the potential for the next invader to be an Asian carp is spurring both the provincial and federal governments into action.

The spectre of this species of carp — the biggest of which can reach 1.2 metres and 45 kilograms — making its way into the Great Lakes has scientists warning of dire consequences. They say it could gobble up massive amounts of plankton, starving out native species such as trout and walleye.

That would unravel the aquatic food web and threaten the region's \$7 billion fishing industry, and on the Ontario side, a commercial fishery worth up to \$215 million a year.

So together with provincial and federal fisheries biologists and policy-makers, emergency response experts are spending their Friday grappling with a scenario in which a truck importing live Asian carp slips past border officials at the Ambassador Bridge linking Detroit and Windsor.

The simulation calls for the truck to travel on one of the 400-series highways on its way to a Toronto fish market. But it will run into backups and be diverted toward the Thames River. It will then have an accident, spilling its load of live carp into the river, which leads into Lake St. Clair.

"We think it's a real possibility," says Jennifer Keyes, manager of the MNR's Great Lakes and water policy section.

"We're testing our respective organizations' readiness. How fast can we pull the right people together? Do we have all the right protocols, procedures, jurisdictional issues resolved with our partners in the [federal] Department of Fisheries and Oceans, as well

as the local communities? Would we involve the local conservation authorities? What role would First Nation communities surrounding that area play?"

Altogether, eight MNR and DFO employees will run through a series of unexpected twists and turns. Watching the whole thing unfold will be about 70 people — representatives of the U.S. states bordering the Great Lakes, local conservation groups and other government employees — all hoping to learn from the exercise.

To poison or not to poison

In one scenario, authorities will learn of the accident right away, in which case the fish can be contained with nets upstream and downstream from the place they spilled into the river. When containment happens early, it's possible to pass an electrical current through the water to temporarily stun any fish in its path. The fish rise to the surface, where authorities can identify and scoop out the Asian carp in particular.

But government employees will also face the prospect of learning of the accident some hours later. In this case, they will have to decide whether to pour fish poison into the Thames. At the same time, they will be told that some endangered species of fish make their home in that stretch of the river. As Keyes points out, it will not be a decision they take lightly.

Whatever the outcome, the exercise is an example of how seriously authorities are taking the potential impacts of an Asian carp invasion.

Just last week, a Markham, Ont., fish importer was fined \$50,000 for driving a truckload of live Asian carp from the United States across the Windsor-Detroit border. It was the largest fine ever for an Asian carp conviction in Ontario. It was the second conviction for Feng Yang, who was also ordered to forfeit more than 1,800 kilograms of carp. And on Monday, an Indiana company caught bringing live Asian carp into Canada was fined \$20,000.

Live fish are brought across the border as part of various cultural traditions that involve releasing them into waterways on special occasions, say MNR officials.

But in 2005, Ontario introduced legislation making it illegal to possess, sell or import Asian carp and other live invasive species. That was in reaction to a scare in 2003, when Lake Erie fishermen caught three live bighead carp. DNA tests deter-

mined the fish had not grown up in the lake but had been released there as adults.

According to the Asian carp regional coordinating committee in the U.S., which includes federal authorities as well as state and local agencies in Illinois and Chicago, a total of five Bighead carp have been collected between 1995 and 2003 in western Lake Erie.

Carp breach barriers in U.S. waters

South of the border, most of the concern has centred on waterways in and around Chicago leading to Lake Michigan. Two types of Asian carp — bighead and silver — have been found in those waters after slowly but surely migrating up the Mississippi River.

The fast-growing and fast-breeding fish were imported from Southeast Asia in the 1970s to control algae in Arkansas aquaculture ponds, but flooding in the early 1990s allowed them to spread throughout the Mississippi watershed.

Scientists have singled out the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal — a man-made waterway built in 1900 to connect Lake Michigan and the Mississippi River Basin — as a potential conduit for the fish into the Great Lakes. Two underwater electric barriers on the canal were installed — in 2002 and 2004, respectively — to keep the fish out while allowing commercial boat traffic to continue.

But in June 2010, fishermen caught a bighead carp nearly a metre long while fishing beyond the barriers in Lake Calumet, Ill., about 10 kilometres downstream from Lake Michigan. Last year, Notre Dame biologist David Lodge led a team that found Asian carp eDNA — DNA in microscopic bits of tissue shed from the fish — in Calumet River and Calumet Harbor on Lake Michigan.


At the time, Lodge said some Asian carp might have escaped into Lake Michigan but that he was uncertain whether there was a reproducing, self-sustaining population in the lake.

In the U.S., legislation making its way through Congress calls for an expedited study of how to separate the Mississippi and Great Lakes watersheds. Meanwhile, Ontario is supporting five U.S. states in their lawsuit currently before a federal court to close navigational locks on the canal, which would create a physical barrier against the fish making their way into Lake Michigan.

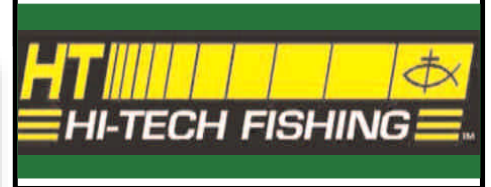
"We have to have a plan," says Boysen. "Asian carp will be a game changer in the ecosystem."

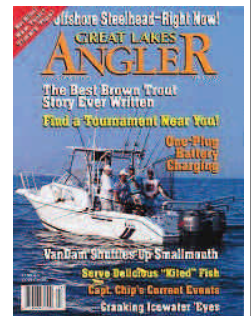

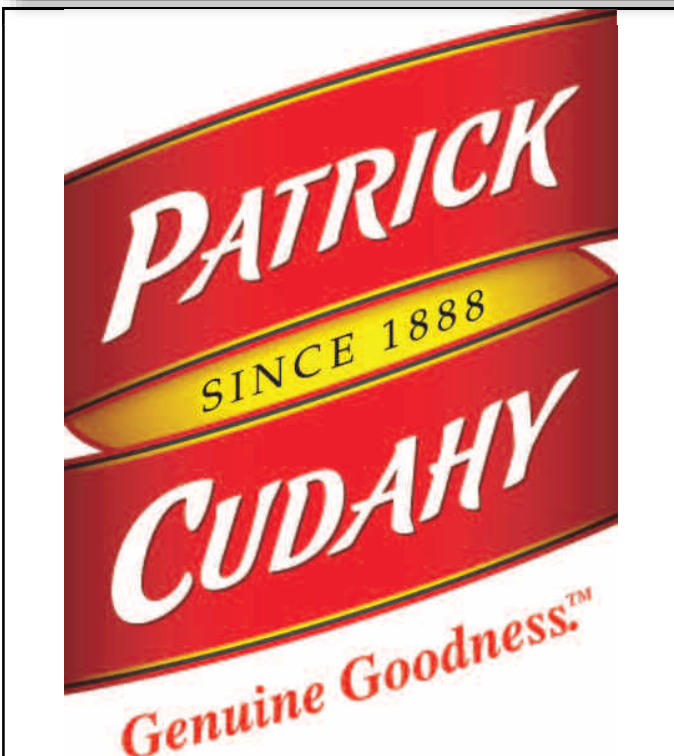

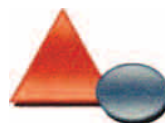

Great Lakes Fishery Commission Urges Immediate Passage of Bill to Stop Asian Carp and Other Invasive Species

Bill, introduced by Senators Stabenow and Durbin, and Congressman Camp, would accelerate separation of Mississippi and Great Lakes basins

ANN ARBOR, MI—The Great Lakes Fishery Commission today applauded the introduction of the Stop Asian Carp Act of 2011, a bill designed to stop the spread of Asian carp and other invasive species via the Chicago Area Waterway System. The legislation, introduced today by Senators Debbie Stabenow (MI) and Dick Durbin (IL) and Representative Dave Camp (MI), would require the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, within a year and a half, to prepare an action plan that outlines the feasibility and the best means of achieving ecological separation of the once-naturally-separated Great Lakes and Mississippi River watersheds. Such separation is essential if the movement of Asian carp and other invasive species between the two basins is to be stopped.

The Chicago Area Waterway System, a series of canals and rivers in and near Chicago, is a manmade connection of the Great Lakes and Mississippi River basins. The waterway is a vibrant transportation corridor, a route for pleasure boats, and a water management system; any study, as is the case with this bill, must take transportation, economic, and water management factors into account. The Great Lakes Fishery Commission (and many others) has repeatedly identified separation as the only viable way to permanently address the invasive species problem caused by that direct link between the two basins [www.glfcc.org/fishmgmt/Hansen_testimony_aisancarp.pdf]. In March, 2010, citizen advisors to the commission—from both Canada and the United States—passed a joint resolution making the same recommendation [http://www.glfcc.org/staff/resol2010_1.pdf]. The legislation complements efforts underway by the Great Lakes Commission and the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities Initiative to investigate ways to achieve separation.

“This important legislation directs the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to apply their considerable engineering expertise to answer a complex question: how do you achieve ecological separation of the Great Lakes and Mississippi basins in the Chicago Area?” said Commissioner Michael Hansen, a professor at the University of Wisconsin at Stevens Point. “This legislation, if enacted, would significantly expedite the process to identify the ways to achieve separation.”

Hansen added: “We must support every effort to keep Asian carp and other invasive species out of the Great Lakes. Invasive species harm the ecosystem and the economy. They threaten the \$7 billion fishery and they undermine tourism, jobs, and prosperity. This bill acknowledges the importance of invasive species prevention and sets us on a course to achieve ecological separation with all haste.”

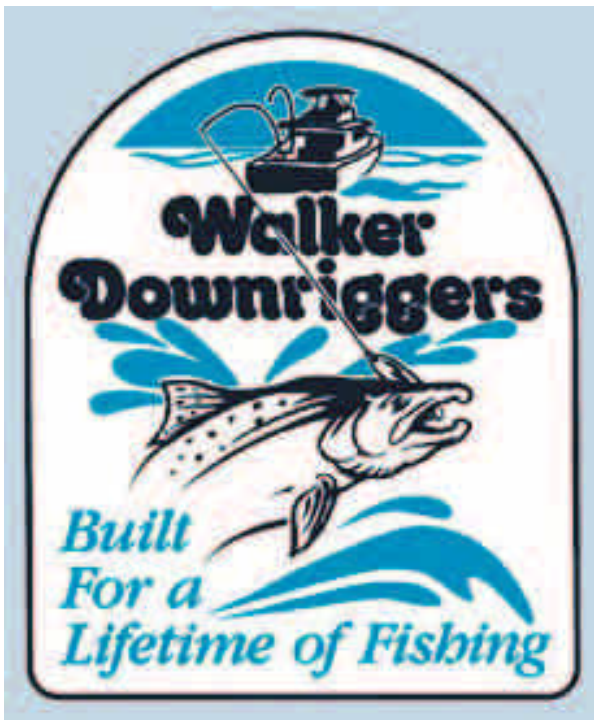

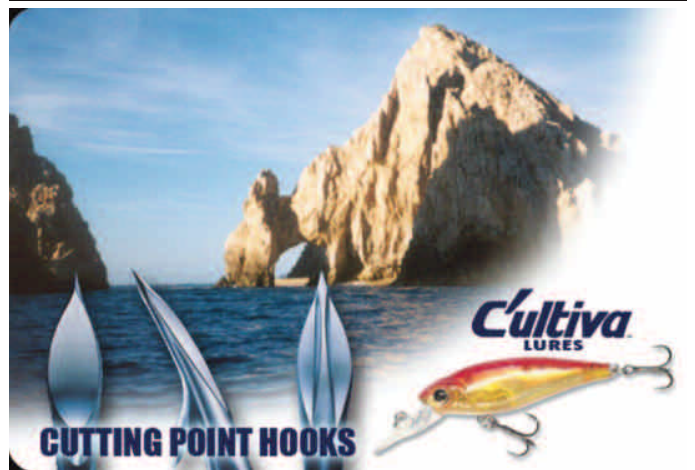

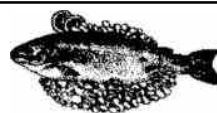
